Prerequisites: 12 credit hours towards the MPH degree; or third or fourth year medical student; or MD degree; or permission of instructor

Course format: A reading and writing intensive, online (Blackboard)/classroom course

Objectives:

- To develop knowledge of selected controversial issues in public health, including globalization, agribusiness, obesity, gun violence, the role of bisexual men in the epidemiology of the HIV epidemic, urban poverty, and the relationship between health, social justice, equity, quality and access to healthcare.
- To stimulate students to participate in online discussion of public health issues that may not be taught in traditional public health courses
- To sharpen the student's ability to think critically and articulate their arguments effectively with peers

Course requirements:

- Attend orientation on 1.12.2008
- Read the assigned books and post a 1500-word review of each book to the course web site based on personal and professional experience, and knowledge of epidemiology, public health and prevention.
- Participate actively in an online forum for peer review, critique and spirited online discussion
- Participate actively in class discussions
- Midterm and Final exams based on themes covered in the course reading
