



Kamp Answers You've Been Waiting For!

I hope you had some fun with the questions yesterday. Karren Streagle picked Bill Givler's brain for most of the information. Here are the long awaited answers:

The original name of what is now known as the Heart of Virginia Council was the Richmond Council. It was first chartered in 1913. The council, which included Petersburg, Hopewell, and Colonial Heights, was called the Robert E. Lee Council. It merged with the Richmond Council around 1942, when it's Scout Executive went away to war. The Richmond Council's first president was John Bryant, Sr., editor of the local newspaper. Therefore the first Scout Office was located in the newspaper building.


The first summer camp was held the year after the Richmond Council was chartered, in 1914. There were two camps in the beginning because the camps were segregated: Shawondassee and Wakoda. They were located on each side of Pocahontas State Park. The council became integrated in 1971 and the camps were integrated in 1964 with the opening of Camp T. Brady Saunders. Camp Shawondassee is now owned by the YMCA and is called Camp Thunderbird.

The first Camp Ranger was named Partee. (Bill could not remember his first name.) While working at Camp Shawondassee, he hired a teenager named Amour DeChamps to work for him. When Mr. Partee retired, Amour took over as the ranger. John Hankins, now Reservation Superintendent, followed Amour in 1981, and Ranger Tim Streagle came on board in 1999. There have only been 4 Camp Rangers in the history of our council.

Camp Brady Saunders held its first summer camp in 1964. The renovated camp opened in 1984. Camp Brady Saunders has had 6 critters on its patches – (not in any order) Beavers, Bears, Chipmunks, Foxes, Bees, and Geese. The Cub and Webelos Adventure Camp held its first summer camp session in 2002. The first themes used by the Cub and Webelos Adventure Camp have been Western, Medieval, Circus, and Sea Adventure. This Summer's theme is Discovering Virginia - 1607.

The Scout Executive for the Heart of Virginia Council is Brad Nesheim.

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Baden-Powell's Last Message

Towards the end of his life, although still in comparatively good health, he prepared a farewell message to his Scouts for publication after his death. It read:

It is much the same with me, and so, although I am not at this moment dying, I shall be doing so one of these days and I want to send you a parting word of goodbye.

Remember, it is the last time you will ever hear from me, so think it over. I have had a most happy life and I want each one of you to have a happy life too.

I believe that God put us in this jolly world to be happy and enjoy life. Happiness does not come from being rich, nor merely being successful in your career, nor by self-indulgence. One step towards happiness is to make yourself healthy and strong while you are a boy, so that you can be useful and so you can enjoy life when you are a man.

Nature study will show you how full of beautiful and wonderful things God has made the world for you to enjoy. Be contented with what you have got and make the best of it. Look on the bright side of things instead of the gloomy one.

But the real way to get happiness is by giving out happiness to other people. Try and leave this world a little better than you found it and when your turn comes to die, you can die happy in feeling that at any rate you have not wasted your time but have done your best. 'Be Prepared' is the way, to live happy and to die happy - stick to your Scout Promise always - even after you have ceased to be a boy - and God help you to do it.
