Gadsden Flag

Flag retirement ceremony



In fall 1775, the United States Navy was established to intercept incoming British ships carrying war supplies to the British troops in the colonies. To aid in this, the Second Continental Congress authorized the mustering of five companies of Marines to accompany the Navy on their first mission. The first Marines that

enlisted were from Philadelphia and they carried drums painted yellow, depicting a coiled rattlesnake with thirteen rattles, and the motto "Don't Tread On Me." This is the first recorded mention of the future Gadsden flag's symbolism.

At the Congress, Continental Colonel Christopher Gadsden was representing his home state of South Carolina. He was one of three members of the Marine Committee who were outfitting the first naval mission. It is unclear whether Gadsden took his inspiration from the Marines' drums, or if he inspired them himself.

Before the departure of that first mission, the newly appointed commander-in-chief of the Navy, Commodore Esek Hopkins, received the yellow rattlesnake flag described above from Gadsden to serve as his distinctive personal standard.

Baden-Powell's Last Message to Scouts

One step towards happiness is to make yourself healthy and strong while you are a boy. so that you can be useful and so can enjoy life when you are a man.

Nature study will show you how full of beautiful and wonderful things God has made the world for you to enjoy. Be contented with what you have got and make the best of it. Look on the bright side of things instead of the gloomy one.

But the real way to get happiness is by giving out happiness to other people. Try and leave this world a little better than you found it and when your turn come to die, you can die happy in feeling that at any rate you have not wasted your time but have done your best.

"Be Prepared" in this way, to live happy and to die happy — stick to your Scout promise always — even after you have ceased to be a boy — and God help you do it.


The District Award of Merit is the highest award that a district can present to its volunteers. It is awarded to those that have provided outstanding service to Scouting in the District.







WOOD BADGE ELEMENTS

The First US Wood Badge Scoutmaster

To familiarize the United States with Wood Badge, John Skinner Wilson, Gilwell Park Camp Chief, came from England to provide a Rover Scout Wood Badge Course for BSA at New Jersey's Mortimer L. Schiff Scout Reservation.

Bill Hillcourt was a member of the Burnham Patrol on that WB Course, May 12-20, 1936. Four days later, May 24 to June 3, 1936, Bill was the Staff Troop Leader and "Dog's Body" (Senior Patrol Leader) for a second course. It qualified Bill to receive his WB Beads in 1939, and to become the national Deputy Camp Chief of the United States.

Early in 1948, the new Scout Executive who had replaced Dr. James E. West, appointed four national Staffers to get Wood Badge underway as a national training standard.

These four national Professional Staffers decided from the start that two BSA Wood Badge courses would be run in 1948. William "Green Bar Bill" Hillcourt was the Scoutmaster for both.



William "Green Bar Bill" Hillcourt's Totem became a circle with "WILLIAM HILL-COURT" as it's circumference: "Bill" was handwritten at an angle over a PL's two green bars inside the circle; at its bottom, two leather throngs came out of a WB Woggle; the left one held three beads and the right one, two beads -- Bill was a "5-Beader"!



History of the Patrol System

The principles of the Patrol System were first introduced by the Founder, Baden-Powell, when he was with the British Army in India. The system he devised enabled soldiers to operate in small groups and use their own initiative within the overall plan of campaign.

To advance the idea within the Army B-P wrote a small book Aids to Scouting. It was so novel and at the same time practical that many members of the teaching profession adapted these principles to teaching.

When the Movement was founded and Scouting for Boys was published, the Patrol System became one of the basic elements of Scouting. The Patrol System not only gave a real adventure aspect to the program and responsibility to boys themselves, but it also blended perfectly with the natural desire in boys to form into gangs in their neighborhoods and schools. It was these very gangs which met in the streets who spontaneously formed themselves into Patrols and started Scouting.

What was it then which so appealed to boys and accounted for the phenomenal growth of the Movement? It was a combination of the appeal of real adventure offered by the program. coupled with the challenge it offered to the "Gang" to plan it's own activities and to be responsible to itself for discipline, without interference from adults.

The Patrol System on its own will not work because of itself. For the Patrol System to have meaning, adventure must be supplied also.

The Patrol System allows boys to form themselves into self-selected gangs and allows members of the Patrol to choose their own boy leader.

The Patrol and the Patrol Leader carry a responsibility to plan and conduct the activities and to take care of discipline within the Patrol. Each Patrol must know the fun of planning and executing its own adventures, it must make its own decisions and learn to profit by its own mistakes.

Thus, collectively, the Patrols are responsible for Troop standards and behavior. Responsibility for this falls squarely on the shoulders of the Patrol Leader, although each member of the Patrol must play his part.

When the first Scout Patrols were formed, there was no such thing as a Scoutmaster, but boys soon found they needed help and advice from someone older in order to carry out the more adventurous activities.

It is important that each Patrol makes its own plans and works out its own problems; turning only to the Troop Scouters for advice, new ideas and guidance: someone who can do things for them which are beyond the Patrol's powers.

You also need Patrol Spirit, that element that gets zip and go into everything the Patrol sets out to do. With Patrol spirit a Patrol becomes strong and permanent. Without it a Patrol is just a bunch of boys.

DID YOU KNOW?

Richmond's WWI Scouts Respond to "Scout Call'

During World War I, Scouts the Richmond area were available to the governor through Scout Call, a special code of fire bells in case of emergency. The signal was 7-8-9. One Saturday afternoon, shortly after war was declared, Governor Stuart issued a surprise drill, sending out a note to the fire department's electrician ordering the Scout Emergency Alarm.

Within 40 minutes the Capitol steps had filled with 700 to 800 boys in ranks, marched in by their deputy commissioners and Scoutmasters and "pledged their services in any emergency which may arise in the war between the United States and Germany."

The governor appeared and commended all present for speed and efficiency, adding that he would depend on their use if needed. No such need appears in the records of the day.

First "Local Jamboree"

In 1964, the Robert E. Lee Council held the 50th Anniversary Council-Rama to bring the scope of the jamboree to every Scout, not just a "fortunate few" who could afford to attend those far-flung assemblages.

5,000 Scouts pitched 3,000 tents at Strawberry Hill where Scouts spent three days plying the gamut of Scouting skills and fellowship with other Scouts.
