Liberty Flag



In the years leading up to the American Revolution groups known as The Sons of Liberty formed throughout the colonies to protest against British rule. Their flag became known as the Liberty Flag. The flag took on several variations with two versions proving to be most popular. One contained 13 horizontal red & white stripes representing the 13 colonies. The other contained 9 vertical red & white stripes representing the 9 original colonies that first protested against the British through the Stamp Act of Congress in 1765.

Liberty flags were flown from Liberty Trees or Liberty Poles in towns throughout the colonies signifying a location at which those opposed to the British could meet with like minded colonists. The most famous of these was the Boston Liberty Tree. This tree was a magnificent elm that stood on the common green. During British occupation of the city the tree was cut down used for firewood to spite the opposition. Today you can find one of the original Liberty Flags on permanent display in the Old Boston State House.

Baden-Powell on Teacup Storms

"I SHAN'T play any more in your yard," was the refrain of a charming song, which was very typical of the child who does not, after all, like the way the game is played, so it "cuts off its nose to spite its face," and goes and tries for another game elsewhere, or goes and "tells Mother."

It makes the grown-up onlooker smile, but the grown-up himself is not always free from the same sort of self-centred conceit.

I have frequently figured in the part of "mother," and it is almost beyond belief that grown-up, or nearly grown-up, men can take little matters so seriously and so narrowly as some of them do. If they had only a sense of humor, or had a slightly wider range of view, so that they could see the other side of the question or its greater aim, they, too, would smile at the littleness of it all.

As "mother" I was appealed to the other day in a case which was evidently considered of vast importance by the contending parties, but which would have seemed ridiculously simple to an outsider who saw both sides and the higher motive which was supposed to be their

My reply to them was one which might apply to many similar cases where the contestants cannot at once see the right line to take.

"It is curious to me that men who profess to be good Christians often forget, in a difficulty of this kind, to ask themselves the simple question, 'What would Christ have done under the circumstances? and be guided accordingly."

Try it next time you are in any difficulty or doubt as to how to proceed.

Fevton confirmed that Boy Scout officials have revoked Hawkins' navigation, orienteering, and wilderness-survival merit badges.



"You can only try and Do Your Best" said Billings.



We Choose to Go to the Moon

In this 1962 speech given at Rice Univer-

sity in Houston, Texas, President John F. Kennedy reaffirmed America's commit ment to landing a man on the moon before the end of the 1960s. Those who came before us

made certain that this country rode the first waves of the industrial revolution, the first waves of modern invention, and the first wave of nuclear power, and this generation does not intend to founder in the backwash of the coming age of space. We mean to be a part of it--we mean to lead it. For the eyes of the world now look into space, to the moon and to the planets beyond, and we have vowed that we shall not see it governed by a hostile flag of conquest, but by a banner of freedom and peace. We have vowed that we shall not see space filled with weapons of mass destruction, but with instruments of knowledge and

understanding.

Yet the vows of this Nation can only be fulfilled if we in this Nation are first, and, therefore, we intend to be first. In short, our leadership in science and industry, our hopes for peace and security, our obligations to ourselves as well as others, all require us to make this effort, to solve these mysteries, to solve them for the good of all men, and to become the world's leading space-faring nation.

We set sail on this new sea because there is new knowledge to be gained, and new rights to be won, and they must be won and used for the progress of all people. For space science, like nuclear science and all technology, has no conscience of its own. Whether it will become a force for good or ill depends on man, and only if the United

States occupies a position of preeminence can we help decide whether this new ocean will be a sea of peace or a new terrifying theater of war. I do not say that we should or will go unprotected against the hostile misuse of space any more than we go unprotected against the hostile use of land or sea, but I do say that space can be explored and mastered without feeding the fires of war, without repeating the mistakes that man has made in extending his writ around this globe of ours.

There is no strife, no prejudice, no national conflict in outer space as yet. Its hazards are hostile to us all. Its conquest deserves the best of all mankind, and its opportunity for peaceful cooperation many never come again. But why, some say, the moon? Why choose this as our

goal? And they may well ask why climb the highest mountain? Why, 35 years ago, fly the Atlantic? Why does Rice play Texas?

We choose to go to the moon. We choose to go to the moon in this decade and do the other things, not because they are easy, but because they are hard, because that goal will serve to organize and measure the best of our energies and skills, because that challenge is one that we are willing to accept, one we are unwilling to postpone, and one which we intend to win, and the others, too.

It is for these reasons that I regard the decision last year to shift our efforts in space from low to high gear as among the most important decisions that will be made during my incumbency in the office of the Presi-







WOOD BADGE ELEMENTS

Wood Badge Course

Executive Elbert Fretwell was the Wood Badge concept in the United States. Fretwell drafted four national staff members to head the effortand the team modified the Wood Badge course to include specific American touches. Patrols were named after American birds, patrols were instructed to create a patrol flag and totem, there were program and service patrol designations each day, and of course, the singing of the song "Back To Gilwell" was introduced. The course syllabus focused almost exclusively on scout skills as well as portions devoted to patrol methods, troop organization & planning, and various activities from the Handbook for Scout-

The very first course of this new "American" Wood Badge was held on July 31, 1948. 29 men from 12 different states participated. Even though rain poured down for 4 of the 9 days the course was an immediate hit.

Though the course content has gone through several changes since 1948 the overall structure remains the same and the core goal of delivering the best trained leaders possible to America's youth scouts stands

The First US

The very first Wood Badge course to be held in the United States took place May 12-20, 1936 at Schiff Scout reservation in Mendham New Jersey. Baden Powell was on hand to help promote the Wood Badge concept in the United States. The Schiff Scout Reservation provided a much larger venue for the course (470 acres vs. Gilwell's 57) but the British Wood Badge syllabus was strictly followed. In the end the participants expressed disappointment and disapproval of the course and recommended that the BSA not adopt the Wood Badge concept for US Scout Leaders. The national office accepted and followed their

recommendation. In 1948, BSA Chief Scout convinced to once again try out Jamboree was held in 1920 from

July 30th - August 8th in the London at the Kensington Olympia arena. In order to allow scouts to "camp" inside the 6 acre glass roofed arena, a one foot thick layer of soil was installed and covered with turf. The arena was able to hold 5,000 scouts, however, over 8,000 scouts arrived to participate in the event. An overflow camp was established at Old Deer Park in nearby Richmond and scouts were rotated between the two venues to ensure everyone was able to experience the

DID YOU KNOW?

Richmond Scout Gave Life to Save Others

In late 1918, Richmond Boy Scouts were on duty 24 hours a day with such endeavors as ambulance service to help victims of the Spanish influenza epidemic. With many doctors serving abroad during WWI, those at home were hard-pressed. The disease struck 38,000 Richmonders, leaving more than a thousand dead.

A newspaper summary for the Scouts' silver anniversary notes that "tragically enough the Scout who is credited with thinking of this service and who was probably among the most active during the epidemic died in the performance of this 'good turn' and today in St. Paul's Episcopal Church there is a memorial window dedicated to the memory of John Langborn Williams III, Troop 5, who in the ministry of mercy to others at the emergency hospitals at John Marshall High School and other places where hundreds lay ill, contracted the disease which proved fatal to him."

Scouts Give Richmond It's Own Statue of Liberty

In 1950, Boy Scouts in the Robert E. Lee Council raised over \$400 to purchase and erect a replica of the Statue of Liberty in Chimborazo Park where it still stands today.

The project was the brainchild of Kansas City businessman, J.P. Whitaker, who was then Scout Commissioner of the Kansas City Area Council. It was part of the BSA's "Stregthen the Arm of Liberty" crusade.



BEAVER PATROL Beaver Patrol Troop Guide Jeff DeHoff is spending an inordinate amount of time and effort in the planning and construction phases of building his dam, according to neighbors close to the project.

DeHoff has visited hundreds of other dams and drawn up detailed and extensive blueprints. He has researched topics ranging from advanced dome acoustics to the near-extinction of the North American beaver in the early 20th century, and plans to incorporate much of his research into his design.

Many in the area believe that DeHoff will fail and resort to burrowing a hole in the muddy ground where he will spend the rest of the season, as he has done the past three years.



OWL PATROL

Les Thorpe was stunned to discover that just days after being appointed Owl Patrol Troop Guide, Greenpeace decided the Northern Spotted Owl was "not worth the trouble anymore."

Citing "organization-wide disinterest in this mundane species of bird," Greenpeace announced Monday that it is ending its decades-long fight to save the endangered owl. "We devoted more than 30 years to trying to save this unspectacular little owl," Greenpeace associate director Tomas Lindstrom said. "Somewhere along the way, I guess we just came to our senses and lost interest." Lindstrom said the environmental group plans to shift its focus to "saving animals that people actually see every once in a while."



BOBWHITE PATROL

Bobwhite Troop Guide Shawn Coffey is furious over Gov. Phil Bredesen speaking out Monday in favor of changing his state's bird from the Bobwhite Quail to "anything else" following the ninth unprovoked quail attack this year.

"In light of last week's events, I strongly feel the Bobwhite is no longer a good representative for the state of Tennessee," Bredesen said, referring to Friday's tragic dive-bombing and pecking incident at a Nashville preschool.

"Maybe it's time we pick one of our more docile birds, like the robin or the magnolia warbler."

Bredesen also advised anyone hearing the quail's cries of "bob, bob-white" to run for cover immediately.



BEAR PATROL

John Long is using his new position as Bear Patrol Troop Guide to highlight a disturbing trend in America.

According to a report released Monday by the mediawatchdog group Fairness and Accuracy In Reporting, U.S. media coverage of bear attacks is biased, with 98 percent of such reports taking the side of the attacked humans.

"The media in this country are blatantly anti-bear," John said. "Virtually every time a bear is taunted, harassed or provoked into lashing out at humans, the bear is depicted in the media as the aggressor."

The report states that out of the 411 cases of bear-human conflicts in the last year, humans were victorious in 410 cases.




EAGLE PATROL


