1		Show that you know first aid for and how to prevent injuries or illnesses that could occur while camping, including:

4		Do the following:
a.	T3	Make a duty roster showing how your patrol is organized for an actual overnight campout. List assignments for each member. On the campout, assist in preparing and cooking one of your patrol's meals. Tell why it is important for each patrol member to share in meal preparation and cleanup, and explain the importance of eating together.
5		Do the following:
a.		Prepare a list of clothing you would need for overnight campouts in both warm and cold weather. Explain the term "layering."
b.		Discuss footwear for different kinds of weather and how the right footwear is important for protecting your feet.
c.		Explain the proper care and storage of camping equipment (clothing, footwear, bedding).
d.		List the outdoor essentials necessary for any campout, and explain why each item is needed.
e.	T1	Present yourself to your Scoutmaster with your pack for inspection. Be correctly clothed and equipped for an overnight campout. Present yourself to your leader, properly dressed, before going on an overnight camping trip. Show the camping gear you will use. Show the right way to pack and carry it.

b.	Discuss the advantages and disadvantages of different types of lightweight cooking stoves.		
c1	Prepare a camp menu. Explain how the menu would differ from a menu for a backpacking or float trip. Give recipes and make a food list for your patrol. Plan two breakfasts, three lunches, and two suppers.	F4a	Help plan a patrol menu for one campout that includes at least one breakfast, one lunch, and one dinner and that requires cooking at least two meals. Tell how the menu includes the foods from the food pyramid and meets nutritional needs.
		F4b	Using the menu planned in requirement 4a, make a list showing the cost and food amounts needed to feed three or more boys and secure the ingredients.
c2	Discuss how to protect your food against bad weather, animals, and contamination.	F4d	Explain the procedures to follow in the safe handling and storage of fresh meats, dairy products, eggs, vegetables, and other perishable food products. Tell how to properly dispose of camp garbage, cans, plastic containers, and other rubbish.

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d. Cook at least one breakfast, one lunch, and one dinner for your patrol from the meals you have planned for requirement 8c. At least one of those meals must be a trail meal requiring the use of a lightweight stove.	S2g	On one campout, plan and cook over an open fire one hot breakfast or lunch for yourself, selecting foods from the food pyramid. Explain the importance of good nutrition. Tell how to transport, store, and prepare the foods you selected.
	F4e	On one campout, serve as your patrol's cook. Supervise your assistant(s) in using a stove or building a cooking fire. Prepare the breakfast, lunch, and dinner planned in requirement 4a. Lead your patrol in saying grace at the meals and supervise cleanup.
9 Show experience in camping by doing the following:		
a. Camp a total of at least 20 days and 20 nights (at a designated Scouting event). Sleep each night under the sky or in a tent you have pitched. You may use a week of long-term camp toward this requirement. If the camp provides a tent that has already been pitched, you need not pitch your own tent.	T2	Spend at least one night on a patrol or troop campout. Sleep in a tent you have helped pitch.
	S2a	Since joining, have participated in five separate troop/patrol activities (other than troop/patrol meetings), two of which included camping overnight.
	S2b	On one of these campouts, select your patrol site and sleep in a tent that you pitched.
	F3	Since joining, have participated in ten separate troop/patrol activities (other than troop/patrol meetings), three of which included camping overnight.
